

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

SUBJECT: Support for EAGER LIGHT Exercises

1. Purpose. This memorandum formalizes an agreement between Commander, United States Army Forces Central Command (USARCENT) through Military Assistance Program, Amman Jordan (MAP-JO) and Commander of the Simulations Center, Jordanian Armed Forces (JAF) regarding the use, storage, maintenance of two generators located at Zarka Military City. This memorandum is effective upon the date of final signatures and will remain in effect until the completion of the final exercise milestone or until terminated by either of the signing commands.

2. General. EAGER LIGHT is an UNCLASSIFIED, USARCENT sponsored, Coalition/Task Force (CTF), computer simulation assisted, Command Post Exercise (CPX) conducted biennially. The intent is to train with a Jordan Armed Forces (JAF) Armored Brigade staff utilizing computer simulations as an event driver. It's scope ranges between seminars, to a Computer-Assisted Exercise/Command Post Exercise (CAX/CPX) using an unclassified force-on-force scenario.

a. The two skid-mounted Cummings 185 KVA generators are stored at Zarka Military City in Zarka, Jordan. Generators were purchased in support of EAGER LIGHT exercises, however Third Army/ARCENT may be used in support of other exercises conducted in the Area of Responsibility (AOR).

b. At the discretion of the JAF Simulations Commander, the generators may be used by the JAF Simulations Center to provide power for the simulations building in support of JAF simulations training.

3. Responsibilities.

a. USARCENT.

(1) The Third Army/ARCENT G3 will be the primary point of contact for all coordination dealing with the storage, maintenance and transportation of the generators.

(2) When possible, schedule trips to the AOR in conjunction with other operational planning and coordination events to evaluate the maintenance and accountability of the generators.

(3) Be prepared to coordinate through MAP-JO for adequate maintenance, transportation and administrative support for the movement and or maintenance of the generators.

(4) If the generators are required for another exercise within the AOR, the Third Army/ARCENT G3 is responsible for coordination with MAP-JO and the JAF Simulations Center for the shipment of the generators.

(5) Notify MAP-JO of JSC 30 days in advance of require, generators to support other Third Army/ARCENT exercises.

b. MAP-JO.

(1) Provide oversight on the storage, maintenance and operation of the generators stored at Zarka Military City.

(2) Notify USARCENT EAGER LIGHT G3 Exercise Planner of any deficiencies in the care/maintenance of the generators.

(3) If requested, assist in the maintenance and storage of the generators if misuse is determined.

(4) Forward maintenance schedule to the Third Army/ARCENT G3 at USARCENT.

c. Jordanian Simulations Center.

(1) Provide adequate overhead coverage and site storage for the generators in an effort to minimize environmental damage to the generators.

(2) Provide a schedule to MAP-JO depicting the plan for storage, maintenance and scheduled use or operation of the generators stored at Zarka Military City.

(3) JAF is responsible for funding for the cost of storage, maintenance and operation of the generators including major end item failure or loss of accountability. The cost of repair shall not exceed the purchase price of a new equivalent model.

(4) JAF will ensure that the generators are operational for EAGER LIGHT. Additionally, JAF shall notify the USARCENT EAGER LIGHT Third Army/ARCENT G3 Exercise Planner of any deficiencies in the care and maintenance of the generators.

4. Effective Date. This memorandum is effective upon the date of the final signature and will remain in effect until modified or terminated by mutual agreement of the signatories.

E2.1.7. Governments of Foreign Countries. The military or civilian governmental organizations, departments, and ministries, or any subdivisions thereof, of a foreign country.

E2.1.8. Implementing Arrangement. A supplementary arrangement for logistics support, supplies, or services that prescribes details, terms, and conditions to implement cross-servicing agreements effectively. While implementing arrangements may normally be more detailed in terms of defined levels of activities than cross-servicing agreements themselves, they must be completely consistent with associated cross-servicing agreements and this Directive. Depending on the nature of the transaction, an implementing arrangement may involve the obligation of funds. For example, an acquisition agreement or a contract may be used as an implementing arrangement. Implementing arrangements that do not involve the obligation of funds may extend for an indefinite period of time.

E2.1.9. International Organization. For purposes of this Directive, the term includes NATO, NATO subsidiary bodies, the United Nations Organization, and any regional international organization of which the United States is a member.

E2.1.10. Logistics Support, Supplies, and Services. Food, water, billeting, transportation (including airlift), petroleum, oils, lubricants, clothing, communications services, medical services, ammunition, base operations support (and construction incident to base operations support), storage services, use of facilities, training services, spare parts and components, repair and maintenance services, and air and sea port services. The term includes temporary use (lease or loan) of general purpose vehicles and other items of non-lethal military equipment not designated as part of the United States Munitions List under 22 U.S.C. 2778(a)(1) (reference (1)).

E2.1.11. Major End Item. Final combinations of items that are ready (assembled) for intended use; e.g., vehicles, self-propelled artillery pieces, missile launchers, and major weapon systems. Major end items are further divided into subclasses of air, ground, support materiel, administrative vehicles, electronics, tactical vehicles, missiles, weapons, special weapons, industrial materiel, and aircraft engines.

E2.1.12. Military Forces of a Country. Agencies or organizations of a government providing armed forces that operate according to the methods, laws, and customs of war, established by act of the government, in which persons are appointed, enlisted, or inducted for military service, and that operate and are administered within a military or executive department.

I've cc'd (b)(6) who may be able to answer my follow-up questions, but why is all \$50m needed to avoid anti-deficiency act problems? The only thing we'd be asking DOJ and Dyncorp for immediately is background checks (which, I assume, costs somewhat less). I assume wouldn't need money at INL to cover the personnel contracts until we ask Dyncorp to sign the contracts.

Would we want Dyncorp to sign personnel contracts prior to passage of the supplemental? It seems risky to me to commit that amount of money without assurance that we'll have funds to operate the program.

How much is translation of the lesson plan?

(b)(6) - good to hear from you. (b)(6) may want to weigh in on this, but my stab at responding to your questions is as follows:

- 1) We will need several hundred trainers and support staff to begin training 1,500 students.
- 2) DOJ advised that they have already identified approximately 100 trainers, but they have not yet been recruited/vetted/processed due to lack of funding. INL could find additional trainers from among the thousands of applications that DynCorp has received thus far -- again, we would need funding to ask DynCorp to conduct background investigations, etc. on these personnel. Also, the Brits may have up to 100 trainers, and the Canadians could probably come up with some, as well. Timeline -- optimistically about 30-45 days to get some trainers on the ground in Iraq (or Jordan) and begin training. We also have to find funding for DOJ to translate the lesson plans for the 8-week course (completed) into Arabic. This could take approximately 30 days or more.
- 3) We cannot ask DOJ or our contractor, DynCorp, to take any action or sign any contracts with trainers without having cash in hand. Otherwise we would be in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act. When we met with CPA, NSC and DOJ the other day we asked for a minimum of \$50 million just to get started. We estimate that the costs for the training and CivPol program will be at least \$1 Billion for one year.

Please note that the CivPol program cannot be divorced from the training program. After an 8-week basic training course, the new Iraqi police will need 10 months of on-the-ground mentoring and advisory programs to ensure that they are implementing their training correctly -- with due consideration for human rights and democratic policing principles. The CivPol contingent will also ensure that international and USG donations of equipment are distributed appropriately and that accountability systems are implemented in every stationhouse and district.

We look forward to hearing from CPA very soon. We are anxious to provide any assistance that we can.

Sec. 1341. - Limitations on expending and obligating amounts

(a)

(1)

An officer or employee of the United States Government or of the District of Columbia government may not -

(A)

make or authorize an expenditure or obligation exceeding an amount available in an appropriation or fund for the expenditure or obligation;

(B)

involve either government in a contract or obligation for the payment of money before an appropriation is made unless authorized by law;

(C)

make or authorize an expenditure or obligation of funds required to be sequestered under section 252 of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985; or

(D)

involve either government in a contract or obligation for the payment of money required to be sequestered under section 252 of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

(2)

This subsection does not apply to a corporation getting amounts to make loans (except paid in capital amounts) without legal liability of the United States Government.

(b)

An article to be used by an executive department in the District of Columbia that could be bought out of an appropriation made to a regular contingent fund of the department may not be bought out of another amount available for obligation

AGREEMENT BETWEEN
THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA
AND
THE GOVERNMENT OF JORDAN
CONCERNING THE USE OF A JORDANIAN SITE
FOR IRAQI POLICE TRAINING

The Government of the United States of America
("United States") and the Government of Jordan ("Jordan")
(hereinafter referred to as "the parties").

In view of their long-standing and close cooperation
in law enforcement and their mutual interest in combating
transnational crime and developing closer regional law
enforcement cooperation;

Have agreed as follows:

ARTICLE I

ESTABLISHMENT AND STATUS OF THE
IRAQI POLICE TRAINING CENTER IN MUWAQA, JORDAN

Jordan will provide the use of the Muwaqah facility, at no cost to the United States, for a period of two years to enable the United States and other international experts to establish the Iraqi Police Training Center (IPTC). The period of time may be extended upon mutual agreement of the parties.

ARTICLE II

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of using the IPTC facility in Muwaqah, Jordan will be:

1. To provide a secure training site that will enable United States led international efforts to train up to 35,000 Iraqi police recruits in basic policing skills and democratic principles of policing.
2. To strengthen cooperation among Iraqi, Jordanian and other international law enforcement entities to combat transnational crimes

ARTICLE III

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE AGREEMENT

The executive agents responsible for compliance with the terms of this Agreement shall be, for the United States, the Department of State, and, for Jordan, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Detailed guidance for the implementation of this Agreement shall be set forth in any implementing arrangements, which shall be considered for purposes of Jordanian law as lesser ranking protocols, as may be necessary. Such arrangements shall be signed by the executive agents designated in this Article, whose authorization to sign shall be established by means of the procedures in effect in the legal system of each Party.

ARTICLE IV

ORGANIZATION OF THE IPTC

1. The IPTC shall be headed by a Program Director appointed and funded by the United States who shall have overall authority and responsibility for the operation of the training center.
2. The United States shall be responsible for the administration and management of the IPTC and for the supervision of any United States or international trainers, support staff and students assigned to the center.
3. The Program Director shall determine the internal structure and administrative rules applicable to the IPTC.

ARTICLE V

FACILITIES FOR THE IPTC

1. Jordan has agreed to provide, at no cost to the United States, the Muwaqah base for a two-year period for the purpose of training Iraqi police, with the period of operation extendable upon mutual agreement by the parties.
2. The United States shall be responsible for making all necessary physical upgrades to the IPTC facility at Muwaqah to enable the conduct of training and support for at least 3,000 students and up to 1,000 trainers and other staff at any given time.
3. In consultation with Jordan, The United States shall be responsible for: plans for the design, construction and/or renovation of the facilities; the contracting process to be utilized; selection of the contractors; and measures to supervise the conduct of construction and/or renovation work.
4. The United States shall bear the costs of maintaining and operating the facility for the period of time it serves as the IPTC.
5. Jordan has agreed to provide travel visas or related accommodation, to include modification of normal; entry requirements, for Iraqi police students and United States and international trainers and support staff.
6. Jordan has agreed to provide 100 Arabic/English translators and 10 accredited Jordanian Police Instructors for the IPTC, at no cost to the United States.
7. Jordan has agreed to provide exterior perimeter security for the IPTC facility.
8. The United States has agreed to provide, in consultation with Jordan, interior security for the IPTC facility.

9. Ownership of the facilities, fixtures and furnishings of the IPTC shall be vested in Jordan, unless otherwise agreed to by the Parties.
10. The facilities dedicated exclusively to the IPTC shall remain so dedicated for the duration of this Agreement, unless otherwise agreed by the Parties following the procedure for administrative rules specified in Article 4, Paragraph 3.

ARTICLE VI

PROGRAM AND OTHER COSTS

Subject to the availability of appropriated funds, which is a matter for the United States Congress to decide, the United States shall bear the costs relating to the programs offered by the IPTC, provided that countries that are able to do so will fund their instructors.

The obligation and expenditure of United States funds shall be in accordance with applicable United States laws and regulations.

The Parties shall establish guidelines on the further definition and allocation of costs described in Articles 5 and 6.

ARTICLE VII

OVERSIGHT

1. The IPTC shall supply either Party, upon request, with information regarding the use of funds or assets provided or financed by that Party within the framework of this Agreement.
2. The Parties shall evaluate jointly, on an annual basis, the implementation of this Agreement, and shall provide each other with all information necessary for such evaluations.
3. In the event of termination of this Agreement, the IPTC shall submit to the Parties a comprehensive report on the resources of the IPTC and the uses to which they were put.

ARTICLE VIII

FISCAL YEAR

The IPTC's fiscal year shall begin on October 1.

ARTICLE IX

TAXATION OF THE IPTC

1. Jordan shall ensure that goods and services imported for purposes of constructing, renovating and operating the IPTC facility shall be free of customs duties, import taxes, value-added taxes, and any other similar taxes or charges.
2. Jordan shall ensure that the IPTC facility will not be subject to taxation or other state charges.

ARTICLE X

PRIVILEGES AND IMMUNITIES FOR IPTC PERSONNEL

1. Upon notification by the United States, Jordan shall accord the Program Director and all Deputy Directors privileges and immunities equivalent to those accorded to diplomatic agents under the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations. This paragraph shall not apply to any such individuals who are nationals of Jordan.
2. Upon notification by the United States, Jordan shall accord instructors, advisors, consultants and other members of the staff of the IPTC who are not nationals of Jordan privileges and immunities equivalent to those accorded to members of the administrative and technical staff of a diplomatic mission under the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations.

ARTICLE XI

OTHER BENEFITS FOR IPTC INSTRUCTORS,
SUPPORT STAFF AND TRAINEES

1. An IPTC instructor, support staff member or trainee who is not a Jordanian National and who is temporarily in Jordan, shall be exempt from:
 - a. Any taxes imposed under the laws of Jordan with respect to payments received from the Academy;

- b. Any customs, import or export duties or taxes otherwise imposed upon personal goods brought to Jordan, for which the temporary import procedure under Jordanian law may be used;
 - c. Any taxes related to lease of a personal residence; and
 - d. Any obligation to obtain a work permit or to pay social insurance contributions.
2. Jordan shall not charge for visas and residence permits issued to IPTC instructors, support staff and trainees who require them in respect of their attendance or service at the IPTC facility.

ARTICLE XII

ENTRY INTO FORCE, MODIFICATION AND TERMINATION

1. This Agreement shall enter into force upon exchange of notes indicating that the necessary internal procedures of each Party have been completed.
2. Either Party may request, through diplomatic channels, consultations on amendment of this Agreement. This Agreement may be amended by agreement of the Parties, following the notification procedure specified in Paragraph 1.
3. Either Party may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving written notice to the other Party, and the termination shall be effective six months after the date of receipt of such notice.
4. If the Agreement is terminated by either Party (the "Terminating Party") before September 30, 2006, due to a material breach of the Agreement on the part of the other Party (the "Breaching Party"), the Breaching Party shall reimburse the Terminating Party the depreciated value at the time of the breach of any fixtures, furnishings, equipment (including computers), and vehicles that were funded by the Terminating Party and that had been delivered to the territory of the Breaching Party.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the undersigned, being duly authorized by their respective Governments, have signed this Agreement.





Back from Jordan yesterday. Good trip. The facility they finally offered, after some "clarification" on just what we need, is in fact just what we need. You might want to take a peek at the SecDef we sent last night.

Briefly, the facility offered gives us a great deal of flexibility regarding training facilities and in effect removes facilities as a pacing element in our plans to accelerate the standing up of a new Iraqi police force. While a ton of details need to be worked out, and actually getting this facility in Jordan up and running will take a concentrated effort all its own, we can now shift our focus to building up the trainer corps and launching an aggressive recruitment campaign for trainees to populate the training facility.

The facility itself is a large logistical terminal or combination depot and repair facility that is under construction by the government of Jordan for the Jordanian police force.

The plan for the center includes huge hangar shaped buildings, administrative buildings, and other supporting structures. The Jordanians will complete two of the hangars, two administrative buildings and a gas station in thirty days. A third hangar can be completed in the same time with our help. The interiors of the hangars can be configured as class rooms, mess halls, sleeping quarters or even exercise rooms or gymnasiums for fitness training; whatever we need.

In addition to the facility itself, the Jordanians have also offered the use of a housing site that is planned for completion by October 15. It was intended for use by a battalion of military police and can serve as housing for trainers and support staff. It is about a forty minute drive from the facility.

This combination is ample for the first class of fifteen hundred recruits, trainers and support staff. (b)(5)
